Priznanje častni vojni znak se kot najvišje priznanje Ministrstva za obrambo podeljuje pripadnikom Slovenske vojske za izjemno hrabrost ali za posebno požrtvovalnost pri izvajanju nalog v miru ali vojni.

Odlikovanje je oblikovano kot oznaka pripadnosti Slovenski vojski, ki jo obkroža venec 22 reliefno stiliziranih lipovih listov zelene barve. Na hrbtni strani znaka je sponka za pripenjanje, saj se je ta do leta 1993 nosil pripet nad levim naprsnim žepom uniforme ali srajce.

Prvič so častni vojni znak za zasluge v vojni podelili 26. oktobra 1991 v Luki Koper, in sicer 16 pripadnikom Teritorialne obrambe Republike Slovenije, med njimi osmim posmrtno, in enemu pripadniku policijskih enot. Leta 1993 je bilo podeljenih še pet priznanj za zasluge v vojni.

The Medal of Honour is the highest award of the Ministry of Defence. It is awarded to members of the Slovenian Armed Forces for exceptional bravery or special sacrifice in carrying out their duties in peace and war.

The decoration is designed as a badge of affiliation to the Slovenian Armed Forces, surrounded by a wreath of 22 embossed, stylized lime leaves in green. There is a clip on the back of the badge for attaching it, because until 1993 it was worn pinned above the left breast pocket of the uniform or shirt.

The first Medal of Honour for Merit in War was awarded on 26th October 1991 in the Port of Koper, to 16 members of the Territorial Defence of the Republic of Slovenia, eight of them posthumously, and to one member of the police units. In 1993, five more such medals were awarded.
